Love Without Measure...

The important line in today's gospel takes place towards the end where it says that Jesus' mother kept all these things in her heart." The things that the gospel had just reported to us comprise a very difficult and painful episode in the life of the Holy Family. For three days Joseph and Mary could not find their son. When the finally find him in the temple Mary says, "Soon your father and I have been looking for you with great anxiety." Great anxiety to be sure. We can only imagine what was going through Jospeh' and Mary's minds as they looked for Jesus: Had he been kidnapped? Was he hurt? – or worse? Finding him was certainly a relief, but the whole experience was a disaster, a frightening and painful ordeal.

So why does the text tell us that Mary kept this painful episode in her heart? Would it not make more sense for Mary to forget that it happened and move on. This gospel says no. Using the example of Mary this gospel tells us that there is a value in remembering all the events of our lives, even the painful ones. Why is this the case? Because whatever happens to us becomes part of our story, and it is only when we can embrace our whole story that we understand who we are and how God is loving us.

All of us have parts of our lives that we wish could be different, that we wish could be changed. But when things happen to us, they become part of us, a part of our story. Then we must try to learn how to keep them in our heart. Recovering alcoholics know this truth well. There are many parts of their lives that they wish could be different: people that they hurt or disappointed, harm that they caused to themselves. But recovering alcoholics understand that the way forward is to claim the past mistakes as they happened, because it is only by doing so that the journey to sobriety and live life fully again.

Anyone who deals with an aging parent or spouse in the last part of life knows what a struggle that this can be: worry, impatience, anger, dismay over the suffering of the person we love. Many times, we don't know what to do or if what we are doing is enough. When death comes, we usually focus on the good times and memories when health was robust and life was joyous. But todays' gospel tells us there is an important advantage a way to wisdom in remembering those dark days of struggle, because the presence and commitment that are displayed there have their own important things to say about love.

We all like to remember the good times. Today's gospel asks us to remember the difficult days as well. Using the example of Mary, who kept all the experiences of her life in her heart, this gospel calls to see that it is better to accept our mistakes, our wounds than to deny them. It is wise to own our painful days rather than forget them, because every day, good or bad, easy or difficult, is a part of our story. And it is only when we embrace our whole story that we realize who we are and that we come to see the unique way that God is loving us.

Advice from the Supreme Court

"Make the family a confessional rather than a court room." A senior Judge of the Supreme Court recently congratulated the bride and groom in a marriage with a pertinent piece of advice: "See that you never convert your family into a court room; instead let it be a confessional. If the husband and wife start arguing like attorneys, in an attempt to justify their behavior, their family becomes a court of law and nobody wins. On the other hand, if the husband and the wife -- as in a confessional -- are ready to admit their faults and try to correct them, the family becomes a heavenly one." Thus we can avoid the dangers we watch in dysfunctional families as presented in TV in the shows like Married with Children, The Simpson's, Everyone Loves Raymond and Malcolm in the Middle.

The Friendly Blue Whale Lamp!

It's one of the great television ads of the year. Touching, but real. In the 30-second story created for Home Goods, a little boy is going through the "monsters under the bed" anxiety stage. Each night at bedtime, his understanding mom and dad patiently check for monsters behind the closet door and under his bed. And to further assure him that he has nothing to be afraid of, they place a special lamp, with a friendly whale at the base, to keep him company at night as he falls asleep. The whale lamp works like a charm. Well, the little boy soon becomes a big brother. And the first night his new baby sister comes home, he goes through all the doors of the nursery and searches under the baby's crib himself to make sure there are no monsters lurking. And then he gives his little sister his first big brother gift: his friendly blue whale lamp to keep her company as she falls asleep.

This charming little commercial tells us a lot about what it means to be family: patience to help one another through life's scary passages, selflessness to walk together in hard times, generosity to give from our own need for the good of the family. On this Sunday after Christmas, the Feast of the Holy Family, we celebrate what it means to be a family. Within our families we experience the heights of joy and the depths of pain. The memories we treasure and the values we embrace within our families are the most important and lasting lessons we will ever learn. Our belonging to a family means that each one of us parent and child - reflects for one another the selfless, limitless and unconditional love of Christ the light (a light that can shine even from a friendly blue whale), both in good times and (more importantly) in bad times, in the joy of the birth of new brothers and sisters and the fear of monsters under the bed. "

World Day of Peace

On December 12, 2024, the Holy See published the Holy Father's Message for the 58th World Day of Peace, which will be celebrated on January 1, 2025, the liturgical Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God, who is likewise the Queen of Peace. The theme chosen by Pope Francis is "Forgive us our trespasses: grant us your peace".

This theme aligns with the spirit of the Jubilee Year, focusing on hope, forgiveness, and bringing people together. Inspired by Laudato Si' and Fratelli Tutti, the message highlights the need for change to build lasting peace in our lives individually, in communities, and worldwide.

In his message, the Holy Father states: "May 2025 be a year in which peace flourishes! A true and lasting peace that goes beyond quibbling over the details of agreements and human compromises. May we seek the true peace that is granted by God to hearts disarmed: hearts not set on calculating what is mine and what is yours; hearts that turn selfishness into readiness to reach out to others; hearts that see themselves as indebted to God and thus prepared to forgive the debts that oppress others; hearts that replace anxiety about the future with the hope that every individual can be a resource for the building of a better world."
